

Stim Bullitt Civic Courage Scholarship Judging Rubric: Participants are asked to describe and analyze an act of civic courage by an individual or identifiable group of individuals in Washington State, and to address the following questions: why this act constituted civic courage; how this act impacted our community, region, or state; and the risks (professional, political, and/or personal) associated with this action. Use the rubric to guide your essay writing on the worthiness of the subject, content, and persuasiveness.
